## **Coordinating Council**

Currently the Chairman of the Conference is Vim Horn. The Coordinating Council members are Richard Neill (Chairman), Steve Kropp (Vice-Chairman), Jack Hagensen, Eric Odida, Jun Pamongcales Jr., Tom Mitchell, Larry Cottrill, Sean Telljohann, and Jay Havener. Although Vim does not vote on Council matters, he has a standing invitation, and he attends all of the meetings, with voice on all matters.

The Council had a nice balance this past year. Three of the men live in Independence - Richard, Jack, and Tom. Larry (Virginia), Sean (Ohio), and Jay (Michigan) live in the Domestic (USA) field, and two reside in the international field – Eric (Kenya), and Jun (the Philippines).

Last year, the Conference voted to add two international men onto the Council. With Zoom, and Livestreaming, we have the ability to have input from all over the world. Just three years ago we first attempted to connect online in a very crude way. Since that time, we have seen tremendous progress in our technology capability. We now have the ability to connect in visual and audible ways. We are now, once again, becoming a 'World Church' in very real ways.

The Conference, of 2021, passed legislation to separate the Evangelism Council into two distinct bodies. One would be called the Domestic Missionary and Outreach Council, and the other to be called the International Missionary Council.

The elected Coordinating Council has the responsibility to call Council meetings, soon after the Conference is over, to help each Council organize itself and select officers for the Council. This was done and both Missionary Councils were organized.

The Domestic Missionary and Outreach Council was set to assist the domestic field of the Center Place, the USA, and Canada bring ministry of outreach. This they have done very well.

The International Missionary Council allows this Council to focus their ministries on the fields outside of the domestic field. This would be done by working with the Missionary Groups of ARM, GEM, LAMB, and SEAAM. These missionary groups would place two of their Board members on this Council. By doing this there is a strong connection with the Conference. Working with Seventy Richard Neill this Council was organized, and has had discussions on what they could do to assist the Missionary Groups fulfill the mission of going into all of the world.

There are a number of items that could be mentioned in relationship to the Coordinating Council working with the Women's Council, the Youth Council, the Domestic Missionary and International Missionary Councils, the Education Council, the Stewardship Council, the Publications Council, and the Aaronic Priesthood Council. That information will be shared with you by the *respective* Councils. Each Council has an assigned member from the Coordinating Council, named a liaison. The liaison will discuss with each Council the Conference agenda, and at the same time apprise the Coordinating Council of the plans, and issues the Councils are working on during the year.

The Council sponsors events throughout the year to gather people together for learning and spiritual growth purposes. I will summarize those gatherings that have taken place this past year. If you want like to experience the presentations for yourself, you can do so by going to eldersconference.com. We invite you to do this to listen to very excellent presentations.

Following the June Conference, the first event was the <u>Fall Gathering</u> held on September 24-25, 2021 at Waldo. The theme was *We Shall Come Rejoicing Bringing in the Sheaves – It is Yet Day When All Can Work.* The classes were *Desire to Reap* (D&C 6:2a-c, 4a-b), *Thrust in Your Sickle – Fill the Spiritual Storehouse, and Gather the Sheaves into the Garners* (Alma 14:84-88). The



Saturday evening service was centered on this message – *Rejoice in the Gathering – A Call to Bring in the Sheaves.* The leaders in worship included – Dayn Cederstrom, Eric Odida, Vim Horn, Tom Mitchell, Steve



Henson, Lucas Boyce, Brian Mundy, Howard Parker, Steve Bohall, Paul Gage, and Cloyce Coffman.

In January 21-22, 2022 a <u>Priesthood and Men's Retreat</u> was held at the Oak Grove RB, in conjunction with the CMRB and the POZ. The theme was – *Perfect and Upright Men of God.* The class on Friday evening was *Perfected by the Holy Spirit*. The classes on Saturday were *No Perfection by the Law, Perfected, as the Master,* and *Perfect Love: Casting Out Fear.* The leaders in worship were Aaron Rhoads, Chuck Miller, Steve Bohall, and Shaun Turner.

The <u>Spring Gathering</u> was held on April 8&9, 2022 at Waldo. The theme was *Take Upon You the Name of Christ*; and *Worship God in Spirit and Truth*. The

classes were How has God Been Worshipped through the Ages, What Does It Mean to worship Him in Spirit, and What Does It Mean to Worship Him in Truth? The leaders in worship included – Steve Kropp, Paul Gage, Vim Horn, Marlin Guin, Andrew King, BJ Schultz. The focus of this gathering was on worship, which is central to the gospel. #### **Education Council**

Unfortunately, the Education Council had a stagnant year without a functioning leader or much participation. Last year most of the members resigned over various issues after long tenures and consistent work especially on printing educational materials. Although some books were printed as planned little else was accomplished. Several meetings were held early in the calendar year to attempt forming a new council but a shortage of interested parties and a lack of a willing leader circumvented forming an active council.

Discussions during the meetings held early in the year were toward shifting the focus of the education council with some possible recommendations:

- 1. Moving responsibility for any printing of materials to the publication committee as feasible.
- 2. The possibility that the education council be a subset or tied directly to the publication council.
- 3. Redirecting the education council to actual education activities instead of preparing or reprinting educational material-for example early youth and child education.
- 4. The possibility that priesthood training materials be part of this restructuring, especially for ministerial license accreditation needed in foreign fields like Rwanda.

## **Domestic Missionary and Outreach Council**

"At the 2021 Elders Conference, the Domestic Outreach Council was formed to assist branches and scattered Saints domestically. We desire to serve through witnessing weekends, preaching, evangelism outreach, youth ministry, or any other way to assist branches or individuals to grow the church.

#### **Southwest Region** – John Mundy

- Visited Albuquerque, NM Chico, CA and Arizona
  - o Preached and visited homes in each of these areas
- Two mailings of 164 letters each have been sent out with 10 good responses. We were able to locate groups meeting in: Albuquerque, phoenix, & Los Angeles that we were not aware of.

#### Midwest Region Activities – Bob Immer

- We are providing ministry to the NE Des Moines branch on the 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday of each month.
  - o April, May, and June have been booked.
- Bob is also following up with the Saints in Nebraska, Missouri, and Illinois

#### South Central Region Activities – Bob Dickson

While a great deal of activity has not yet taken place, I am in the process of making contacts in Texas and Oklahoma in preparation for visits this summer. I have already visited and brought ministry to the Saints in Miami, Oklahoma and have reached out to a church family that resides in Bartlesville, Oklahoma.

I have recently had conversation with a sister in Marlin, Texas. The sister is the wife of the now-deceased Pastor of that once very active Branch. I am advised that the church no longer meets in their church building and that most of the Saints have either left the area of become inactive in the Restoration. She would welcome a visit to Marlin. I have also provided the sister with the Living Hope website address and encouraged her to join our services via livestream.

I also had a visit with a sister who resides in Hearne, Texas. Again, I am told that the group there is small but would relish a visit from traveling priesthood.

I have been able to put together a team of priesthood from Living Hope that is committed to making a trip to Texas this summer. Our plan would be to visit the two branches in DFW and to then travel to central Texas to visit Saints in Austin, Marlin and Hearne. The hole would be to encourage the remaining membership in those areas in the work of the Lord and to provide ministry for a longer period of time if the need and desire arises.

#### Mideast Region Activities - Frank Dippel

This region's outreach activities began in August 2021 after receiving names of possible scattered saints from the Tidings, Restoration Voice, and Restoration Book Store. We found immediately many of the names were from many years ago, but we sent letters to all the names listed.

There were no organized branches or groups in most of the states, so letters were mailed to all the individuals on the list in those states immediately. These letters were to introduce the Conference of Restoration Branches, the All Saints Worship Group and Elder Larry Cottrill it's Pastor. The letters also introduced the Tidings and made the offer to visit on several occasions. They also included phone numbers and email addresses for Larry Cottrill, the CRE and us. West Virginia, Ohio and Virginia where there are existing branches, the information and names were sent to the Pastors. After responses from most of the Pastors were received, and they illuminated active saints and saints that had moved or passed on, letters were mailed the remaining saints in those Pastors' areas.

After a couple months we sent another round of letters to the saints we had received no information on or responses from. The total number of letters mailed were 382.

Our hopes were that the Pastors would contact the individuals in their area, and we could help them find brothers to make visits if they needed assistances. We have had 5 requests for visits or assistance in visits from the letters. Two requests Mickey and I traveled to the Philadelphia area and met with Debbie Mason and her niece Cheryl Craine. We traveled also to the Bloomsburg, Pa area and visited with Beth Dippel. I served communion at both locations and the Lord administered to one saint. One request has not been completed yet and the other 2 were from Elder John Ecihhorn for assistance in the Southeast region but no one was available.

This is some additional information we also received from the letter campaign. We received a letter from one brother, Walter Jacobs, stating how proud he was that we were making this effort. We tired to call several times but finally responded to him by letter. There was a lady in Kentucky, Barbara Solomon, who had recently lost her husband. She was extremely distraught, and we offered to visit several times, but she refused. We called and emailed her many times and reach her a few times. We were made aware to a new group that had started in the Center Place for brothers and sisters who had lost their companions. We contacted them and High Priest Paul Gage emailed Barbara and they communicated. The couple ladies from the group attempted the contact her with no success.

Here is some additional information from the letter campaign. 41 saints had passed away and 12 returned the letters. 2 called and asked not to be bother again.

Southeastern Region Activities – John Eichorn (Abbreviated excerpt from TOZ #138) A letter was written and sent to 150 Saints in the southeast region. The letter was well-received, and many of the Saints wrote or called back, inviting myself and a team member to visit. After much prayer and preparation, Eric Woolery and I began our trip to Alabama on January 13th, to return January 27th. Words are inadequate to describe the blessings God had in store for us.

We started with several names of families in Mobile, Alabama, who invited us to stay in their homes. Our first three days were spent in the home of George and Camille Givens. The entire weekend was sharing faith-built testimonies, the prophetic insights and warnings given by the Lord to our Patriarch Mike Ballantyne, and the promise of the Millennial Reign. The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was observed Sunday morning and two received administration of healings. Tears and hugs expressed our love for these beautiful Saints.

Our next visit was just as blessed as the one we left. Our Brother George (Sunny) Goff and his wife, Jean, greeted us. Their bond in Christ's love was just as genuine as it was in the first home we visited. Sunny, Eric, and I made many home visits during the days and evenings we were in their home.

Eric and I then drove to Pensacola, Florida. We made a phone call to Darrell and Donna Kelly. They invited us to stay in their home. Again, the Spirit of Christ went before us. In four days, we visited in many homes from three to four hours per visit, sharing the love of Jesus. The Kelly's, Eric, and I spent hours with these brothers and sisters, searching the Scriptures, sharing, and listening to the testimonies of deeply concerned Saints.

On the last Sunday of our visit to Florida, I was the guest speaker for the Pensacola Restoration Branch located in Pace, Florida. There, my brothers and sisters and I met in the home of Carmen Trampler. Approximately fifteen Saints were in attendance. Several families were out with COVID. After a lovely meal, we shared testimonies and the Lord's concerns and warnings for His people to be prepared for the hard times ahead of us.

Leaving Florida, we traveled back to Alabama, making visits in Troy, Montgomery, Birmingham, Huntington, and Hartselle, Alabama. Our last stop was in Nashville, Tennessee. The Saints were awesome to provide meals and an overnight sleeping quarters.

At the 2021 Conference of Restoration Elders (CRE), a resolution was passed that renamed the Evangelism and Outreach Council and divided it into two separate councils. The 2021 Conference directed that the membership makeup and perpetuation of the Council would be determined at an organizing meeting comprised of a representative from each of the Missionary Boards associated with the CRE, chaired by the Coordinating Council liaison (Seventy Richard Neill). The Council had its first meeting Tuesday, April 19. At that meeting, it was determined that the council would be comprised of 2 members from each of the 4 missionary boards. The members identified are: Chris Caps and Eric Woolery from ARM (Eric Woolery has since resigned from ARM), John Mundy and Steven Henson from GEM, Manual Castello and Mark Farnham from LAMB, and Kevin Humphrey and Dayn Cederstrom from SEAAM. Dayn Cederstrom was elected Chairman.

The council sets as its goals to coordinate the evangelistic mission of the church among the missionary groups of the CRE, to develop curriculum for the training of priesthood and missionary tracts, and to raise awareness of all Saints of the needs of international evangelism.

## **African Restoration Ministries (ARM)**

## *Kenya Update* by Brian Mundy

The Gospel is exploding as never before in Kenya. We currently have over 5,000 active members in Kenya. At least 12 new groups have started this last fiscal year. Kenya was blessed with several trips from Missionaries from the United States, and we even recently were blessed to have the National Presiding Elder from Nigeria to come and spend 2 weeks ministering to the Saints in Kenya.

One of the most exciting things to see is how God is raising up his young warriors in Kenya. Many youth that are college age are really responding which is so encouraging. God is certainly doing a great work!

Elder Eric Odida and his wife, Pamela, are here for conference and will personally share more exciting details of the growth of the church in Kenya not only numerically but especially spiritually.



# **Mildred Smith Mission Health Center Update - Awasi, Kenya** by Doug Smith

This year has been a year of miracles, and the Lord has provided in ways we could not even imagine. We had to be absent from the clinic from August to November due to Judi needing treatment for severe injuries she had in a motor vehicle accident in Kenya. The Lord provided us with coverage when Efgo Lawis, our Medical Officer who was returning to Medical School had his start date delayed, and then in December our

staff was joined by Presler Odida, Eric Odida's son who had just finished his internship year after medical school. So despite the set backs, the clinic continued to move forward.

This year the Lord made it possible for us to obtain land with a building in the town of Awasi, right beside the Attenzion school. The building was a 2 family dwelling, and we were able to renovate the building into a beautiful and functional clinic space.





Part of that renovation was to place a "Class E" laboratory in the clinic. That is the highest rating for a lab outside of the research labs at the CDC and such places. We have a lab technician named Zablon Otipah who has made it possible for us to do most of our labs onsite, and at a much reduced cost to sending out the tests. It also has been a blessing to clinics and hospitals around us, because they have been able to get tests run on the there patients done immediately, instead of waiting up to a week for results.

Our latest edition to the lab is going to be a PCR testing machine for cervical cancer screening. Cervical cancer is the number one cause of cancer death in women in Kenya, but there is no affordable way to do adequate screening, until now. The test is still very expensive, about 7 dollars a test, so we will be depending on funds to subsidize this screening for our indigent patients, but what a blessing it will be to the community at large to have the capability to screen patients locally.





We have also been blessed with the ability to purchase a Toyota Landcruiser for use as a clinic vehicle. It has been a true blessing in allowing us to make "house calls" to patients who were unable to travel to the clinic, as well as making it possible for us to transport patients from the clinic to a higher level of care when needed, no matter what the weather or the road conditions.


Judi and I were also blessed to

be able to rent a house right across the street from the clinic, meaning we were able to move from Kisumu to Awasi, and save ourselves a 1 to 2 hour commute each day, and also save on the fuel costs of travel. It is actually a duplex, so if other volunteers come to work at the school or the clinic, we will have a place to house them.



We also have been blessed to be able to drill a well to supply

the clinic with water during the dry season. We currently had two 20,000 later tanks o collect rain water, and these did last us for almost 1 year, but as the clinic grows, we anticipate an increasing need for water, and also will be able to supply the school with water as needed. Awasi is known as a very dry place, so water is always a concern, but with the water from the well, we will be able to serve our needs and





All of this work is only made possible by the Lord, through the generous donations of the Saints. Your unfailing support of the clinic and our mission to "visit the sick and he afflicted" and offer comfort in the name of Jesus Christ, is amazing. We are also doing extensive counselling on disease prevention, so I am able to share the principles the Lord gave us in the Word of Wisdom, which is

posted on the wall in the exam room. When we are done with all we can do, we have prayers with each patient, acknowledging that God is our creator and our greatest physician. The prayer is voluntary, but I have yet to have a patient say they do not want to be prayed for, whether Christian, Muslim or Animist. May God bless you all as you seek for ways to fulfil the Great Commission, to share this gospel of the kingdom in all the world.


A first version of the Book of Mormon translated into Kinyarwanda was completed and 9 copies were delivered to the saints in Rwanda. Further corrections are being made and hopefully a final version will be available soon. The field is white in Rwanda. There are two main challenges that we face. First, we need to get the church registered with the country. For this to happen, we need to have priesthood members in Rwanda who either have a theological degree or a certificate in theology. There are other requirements, but this is the only one unmet. We have discussed solutions to this problem in the ARM board and hope to move forward to get the church registered soon.

The final challenge we face is a need for those willing to travel to Rwanda to provide ministry. An increase in sustained, effective ministry in the country will have a profound effect and we believe would see a dramatic increase in the work in Rwanda. We pray that those willing to travel or considering what they can do for the Lord would contact us and investigate the potential of going with us to Rwanda

#### *Tanzania Update* – Brian Herren



Elder Brian Herren, Elder James Yogo, and Deacon Travis Clark were blessed to serve a mission in Tanzania between October 19, 2021 and November 4, 2021. We feel that it must be that every prayer was answered in full and beyond measure for the glory of God, and we hope to give an account of the miracles

and testimonies elsewhere. We also recognize that this report is being made to men far superior in missionary ministry and

experience than we, and whose efforts have laid the foundation for many of the fruits presently enjoyed. We humbly acknowledge our nothingness in comparison to the efforts that were made before our arrival, and our smallness in contrast to those men and women who made them.



We were led by the Holy Spirit to return to the region where we had sown seeds in 2020, to follow up on those foundational efforts and nurture the work where we might.



"Let us go again and visit our brethren in every city where we have preached the word of the Lord, and see how they do." - Acts 15:36

Upon our arrival in Utegi, the Lord hastened His work in extraordinary ways, and made clear His will to us. We taught classes for two full days, and on the third day, baptized eight souls and confirmed nine.

Distinct baptismal services and confirmation services were held, separated by a few hours. Our design was always to encourage the local priesthood to perform the ordinances themselves, as far as they were competent and qualified by authority. However, Brother Albert Okumu shared some uncertainty, and asked for help. After digging out the shallow river bottom to create a pool adequate for proper baptisms, Albert and I entered the waters together, and I baptized the first several candidates as he closely watched. I then called upon Elder Albert to baptize the remainder of the candidates while I stayed near by in the waters to offer assistance as needed.





That same evening, a formal meeting was held to organize an official Restoration branch in Tanzania at Utegi. We offered support so that a pastor, treasurer and secretary were elected by those who had been baptized.

The next day, ground was broken for a new church building in Utegi, to be built of bricks by the hands of the local faithful. During the afternoon, following the dedication service and cornerstone ceremony, several of us went into Tirime to help the newly elected leadership officially open a bank account for

the branch with an initial deposit.

Two full evenings were spent instructing the branch officers in record keeping and branch responsibilities. Special care was given to the pastor to review the ordinances and sacraments.

On our final morning in Tanzania, we concluded with the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. We were awash in the Holy Ghost as the Lord sealed His work in the remembrance of His Son, and the gift seemed especially sweet in the presence of those who were new members of the Church.





After leaving Tanzania, Brother Travis and I served in Kenya. Again, the Lord moved in His everlasting mercies and prevenient grace. In all, we felt the blanketing love of Christ as the Lord impressed upon us His desire to uphold His children with providential care, and give clear vision of His Kingdom. It was hard to leave that beautiful and rugged place after assimilating so thoroughly, and

after allowing our hearts to swell for the people. Our stay was lovely in every way, and the errand filled us in spiritual ways that may be

hard to express. Our feelings were mixed and our hearts provoked as we left the wilderness of Tanzania. We continue to pray that the Kingdom flourish in Utegi, and we continue to thank the Lord for the miraculous ways and means by which we saw His hand move in these recent days.

Some of us receive the *Australian Newsletter*, via email monthly. Missionaries that have been to all of these countries stay in contact with people through Facebook and other means.

#### **Australia**

The Church has been present in Australia since 1873. We have Saints scattered throughout the country. Brothers, Kevin Humphry, Tom Rindels, and Mark Smith have been going there most recently. 


The goal of the
